History of PA Sports Hall of Fame

The Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame was chartered in 1962. It is the only community based Hall of Fame in the Country and its present twenty-seven (27) Chartered Chapters serve more than 300 communities throughout the state of Pennsylvania. Each year the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame inducts area greats of yesteryear and endeavors to include athletes, administrators, coaches, officials, sports medicine and the sports media. The Chapters of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame also honors the scholastic, collegiate, community service and courageous athlete awards within those communities.

The Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame concludes its calendar year with its annual business session and show-case. This Convention and Induction ceremonial normally seats ten living and two deceased inductees (based on the voting results and action of the Board of Governors, it may be nine living and three deceased) inductees on its Dais of Honor who are presented with a Gold Inductee medallion with pendant after a rigorous screening and selection process from a highly disciplined governing structure. The ceremonial is hosted on a rotating calendar among the chapters of its Western, Central, Northern and Eastern Regions.

Perhaps one of its Past Presidents best summarized the philosophy of The Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame, Inc when he responded to a news media inquiry by saying:

"A Hall of Fame is a lot more than an overblown closet for some old relics. It is intended to be a repository for all things great about a sport: its moments, its men and women, its methods. Most of all it is supposed to be about Hall of Famers who define the quality of athletics and who lead the right kind of life-a life of integrity for which there is no compromise."



Charlie Batch was a 1992 graduate of Steel Valley High School in Pittsburgh. Charlie was an outstanding football player that led the Ironmen to the WPIAL AA semifinals his senior season.

He started all four years at Eastern Michigan University, compiling a career 7,592 passing yards and 53 touchdown passes while at EMU.

Charlie was named First-team All-MAC QB in 1995

He was drafted by the Detroit Lions in the second round of the 1998 NFL draft

During his pro career in the NFL he played for 4 years with the Detroit Lions and 11 years with the Pittsburgh Steelers

With the Steelers, he earned two Super Bowl rings-Super Bowl XL and Super Bowl XLIII.

He received the Jerome Bettis Award for Humanity and Community Service in 2006


He was named the Byron "Whizzer" White NFL Man of the Year in 2012

Batch currently works for KDKA-TV in Pittsburgh as a pre-game analyst for the Steelers as well as a color commentator for their preseason games. In addition, he co-hosts the Steeler Post-Game Show on WDVE Radio.

As a local philanthropist, Charlie provides significant financial support and effort on behalf of his



foundation "Best of The Batch" providing support and programs for children and young adults in Western PA.


Gary Leroy Brown (July 1, 1969 – April 10, 2022)

In high school, Brown rushed for over 4,800 yards and scored 74 touchdowns in 3 years. He was named First Team PA-All-State Running Back and led his team to the 1986 Eastern Football Conference Championship (before PIAA playoffs). Gary also was a PIAA State Champion in Track & Field.

After high school, Brown played college football at Penn State and was drafted by the Houston Oilers in the eighth round of the 1991 NFL draft. Brown was an American professional football player who was a running back for eight seasons in the National Football League (NFL) for three teams from 1991 to 1999.

After retiring from professional football following the 1999 season, Gary returned to Williamsport and was hired as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Williamsport High School, and at Lycoming College from 2003 to 2005. From 2006 to 2007, he served as offensive coordinator at Susquehanna University. In February 2008, he was named running backs coach at Rutgers University. Brown accepted a position with the Cleveland Browns in February 2009, as the running backs coach on Eric Mangini's staff. In February 2013, Brown was hired with the Dallas Cowboys as their running backs coach. In March 2021, Brown was hired as the running backs coach at the University of Wisconsin.

Sean Thomas Casey (born July 2, 1974), nicknamed "the Mayor" by his MLB teammates

Outstanding baseball player at Upper St. Clair High School in Pittsburgh, PA (1998-1992)

Outstanding baseball player at the University of Richmond, VA (1993-1995)

As a junior, Casey's .461 batting average led all Division I players and he was the CAA Player of the Year, Second Team All-American and ECAC Player of the Year won CAA Triple Crown.

Cleveland Indians drafted Casey with the 53rd overall selection of the 1995 MLB draft.

During his outstanding Major League Baseball career from 1995 through 2009, Casey played for the Cleveland Indians, Cincinnati Reds, Pittsburgh Pirates, Detroit Tigers, and Boston Red Sox and he was selected for the National League All-Star Team in 1999, 2001, and 2004

Received the Hutch Award in 1999 given to the Cincinnati player who personifies the spirit, courage and integrity of former Cincinnati Reds manager Fred Hutchinson.

Inducted into the University of Richmond, Department of Athletics Hall of Fame in 2003.

Currently, Casey is a prominent broadcaster and commentator for MLB Network.



As a local philanthropist, Casey provides significant financial support for the Miracle League for children with disabilities in Western PA to play baseball.



SWIN CASH-CANAL

Swin Cash is a Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Famer, current Founder/CEO of She's Got Time, a lifestyle and media company building the first holistic ecosystem for women with careers in sports, and a trailblazer in sports leadership, media, and philanthropy. She recently served as the Senior Vice President of Basketball Operations & Team Development for the New Orleans Pelicans.


Throughout her illustrious playing career, Cash cemented her legacy as one of the most accomplished athletes in women's basketball. Gatorade Pennsylvania Player of the Year 1998. Parade Magzine All American First Team 1998. WPIAL Class AAAA Champion 1998. At University of Connecticut, Cash won two National Championships, including 2002 University of Connecticut Undefeated 39-0. A three-time WNBA champion (2003, 2006, 2010), four-time WNBA All-Star (2003, 2005, 2009, 2011), and two-time WNBA All-Star Game MVP (2009, 2011), she also contributed to the U.S. Women's National Team's success, winning two Olympic gold medals (2004, 2012). Her impact on the game was further recognized when she was named one of the WNBA's Top 20 Most Influential Players.

Beyond the court, Cash has been a dynamic presence in sports media, covering basketball and culture for various nationally broadcast platforms. She is also a dedicated philanthropist, founding Cash for Kids, a non-profit committed to empowering youth



through fitness, education, and cultural enrichment.

A respected advocate for social responsibility and civil rights, Cash has worked extensively with the NBA as a Global Ambassador, using her platform to drive meaningful change. Despite her many professional accomplishments, she considers her most cherished roles to be wife to Steve Canal and mother to their two sons, Saint and Syer Cash-Canal



SAM CLANCY



1976 Fifth Ave. HS with only 550 students from 7th to 12th grade Basketball State champs ranked #2 in the country. 1977 transition to Brashear HS after the closing of Fifth Ave ranked # 3 in the country. He was considered one of the greatest athletes the city of Pittsburgh has ever produced, Sam "Bam" Clancy was a four-year basketball starter at Pitt from 1977-81, averaging 14.4 points and 11.6 rebounds per game. He is the only Pitt player to score more than 1,000 points (1,671) and grab over 1,000 rebounds (1,362) in a career.

Clancy was a three-time All-Eastern 8 selection, leading the Panthers to four winning seasons, the 1980 NIT and 1981 NCAA Tournament. He additionally played for legendary coach Bobby Knight and asst coach Mike Krzyzewski as a member of the U.S. Gold Medal team at the 1979 Pan American Games. His decorated basketball career earned him selection to the Pitt Athletics Hall of Fame in 2019 and Pitt's First Team All-Centennial Men's Basketball Team (1905-2006). He additionally was named an Awardee of Distinction by the Pitt Varsity Letter Club (VLC).

Clancy was drafted by two different professional sports leagues: the NBA's Phoenix Suns (1981) and the NFL's Seattle Seahawks (1982) as a tight end, the latter occurring even though he never played collegiate football. Clancy played one season of professional basketball in the Continental Basketball Association (averaging 11.5 points and 8.3 rebounds for the Billings Volcanos) before playing 12 seasons of professional football.

He was a member of the Seahawks and then returned to Pittsburgh to play for the Maulers of the upstart United States Football League, earning the franchise's MVP award. Clancy later played for the USFL's Memphis Showboats before returning to the NFL as an impact defensive end for the Cleveland Browns and Indianapolis Colts. Clancy played for some of the Browns' greatest teams (coached by another Pitt product, the late Marty Schottenheimer), helping the franchise to four playoff berths, three AFC Central Division titles and two AFC Championship Games. He concluded his 10-season NFL career with 227 tackles, 30 sacks and 7 fumble recoveries.



Following his playing days, Clancy coached in NFL Europe, serving as the defensive line coach for the Barcelona Dragons for five years and winning the 1997 World Bowl. He would later serve on the defensive staff of the New Orleans Saints and Oakland Raiders.

He served as a football strength and conditioning assistant for three seasons before transitioning to the administrative side of collegiate athletics with the Pitt Varsity Letter Club. Now in his 14th year directing the VLC, he is responsible for athletics alumni relations, engagement and connecting "Forever Panthers" with current Pitt student-athletes.

January 2025 Clancy became the fifth Men' Basketball alumni to have his jersey retired next to the likes of Don Hennon, Billy Knight, Charles Smith and Brandin Knight. May 2025 Clancy was inducted into the Jewish Sports Hall of Fame for his many years of support.

Clancy returned to the University of Pittsburgh in 2005 to complete a bachelor's degree in social sciences. He served as a football strength and conditioning assistant for three seasons before transitioning to the administrative side of collegiate athletics with the Pitt Varsity Letter Club. Now in his 16th year directing the VLC, he is responsible for athletics alumni relations, engagement and connecting "Forever Panthers" with current Pitt student-athletes.

Sam resides in Collier Township with his wife of 30 years and between them, they have 5 children: Sam, Jr., Samantha, Samario, Evann and Samarcus. They also have 11 grandchildren.







Dr. Hall was a trailblazer at Mount Alvernia High School. The lightning-quick guard captained the girls' basketball team in 1983 and 1984. She led the undefeated 34-0 Lions to the 1983 PIAA Class A State Championship, and over her four years, the team compiled a 113-9 record with three WPIAL titles. Dr. Hall and her team were inducted into the WPIAL Hall of Fame in 2013. Artifacts from the state championship team are preserved at the Heinz History Center.

In 1984, she was named WPIAL Class A Section All-Star, National High School Girls Basketball All-American, Team Most Valuable Player, *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette*'s Finest Five, and Pittsburgh Press Finest Five. Her talented "Allegheny Mountain" AAU team captured two National AAU Championships. She was named a three-time AAU All-American.

Recruited nationally, Dr. Hall signed and received a full scholarship in 1984 to play basketball at the University of Nevada Las Vegas. In her first UNLV season, she was named an alternate on the United States Sports Festival-West team, received second-team All-Pacific Coast Athletic Association All-Conference Player, and earned several PCAA Player-of-the-Week honors.

Renowned for her defensive prowess and knack for steals, Dr. Hall captained the Lady Rebels for two seasons, playing a key role in UNLV's back-to-back PCAA Conference Championships. In 1984-85, the team went 28-5, earning an NCAA tournament bid, and in 1985-86, they finished 22-9, ranked 15th nationally, and advanced to the second round of the NCAA tournament.

Dr. Hall's career at UNLV was defined by excellence. She set the all-time steals record (300), including back-to-back games with 10 steals, ranked second in career free-throw percentage with a Thomas and Mack Record 12-for-12 (surpassing Navy's David "The Admiral" Robinson's 10-for-10), and finished among the program's Top 10 in assists (375). In 1986-87, she ranked seventh in the PCAA in assists and third in steals. She closed the season scoring in double figures in 10 of the team's final 12 games, including a career-high 20 points in the PCAA Championships.



Dr. Hall was the first woman to play, coach, and win back-to-back championships in the Connie Hawkins Men's Summer basketball league. USA Today covered the story. She was also the first woman to coach at the prestigious Five-Star Boys Basketball Camps.

In 1996, Dr. Hall participated in the inaugural tryouts for the Women's Professional American Basketball League (ABL). Despite not making the league, she built a career in sports, spanning NCAA collegiate coaching, sports administration, ESPN3/PLUS broadcasting, NCAA and conference championship operations, authorship of two books, and service as an adjunct professor.

On November 16, 2022, Mayor Ed Gainey proclaimed Dr. Karen Hall Day in Pittsburgh, honoring "a life full of service and a legacy of excellence." The recognition highlights her advocacy for women in sports, including a three-year series, The City of Pittsburgh Celebrates Title IX (2022- 2024).

Dr. Hall has been inducted into the Pennsylvania Girls Basketball Hall of Fame and the Tick Cloherty Western Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame, among other achievements.

Dr. Hall is a member of Women Leaders in Sports, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated, and a Leadership Pittsburgh XL Graduate. She serves as CEO of Ozanam Inc. and is an active parishioner at St. Benedict the Moor Church.

JULE HOLLERAN IGOE



Steve Kline was selected by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the 60th round of the 1991 amateur draft, but did not sign. Instead, he attended West Virginia University where he was named Atlantic-10 Conference Pitcher of the Year in 1993. He was then drafted by the Cleveland Indians in the 8th round in the 1993 amateur draft.

He pitched in the major leagues from 1997, when he made his debut with the Indians, until 2007, when he was with the San Francisco Giants. In all, he appeared in 796 games, making just 1 start, and picking up 39 saves with a record of 34-39 and an ERA of 3.51. He led the National League in games pitched for three consecutive seasons, from 1999 to 2001, and in the third of these, he set a major league record for most games pitched by a left-hander in a season, with 89.

In his rookie season, he was traded to the Montreal Expos. He emerged as a reliable reliever for the Expos in 1998, when he put up an ERA of 2.76 in 78 games. After the 2000 season, he was traded to the St. Louis Cardinals. He spent 4 seasons as a key member of the Cardinals' bullpen, appearing in the postseason 3 times, including in the 2004 World Series which the Cardinals lost to the Boston Red Sox. Overall, his ERA was 0.96 in 13 postseason appearances. Before the 2005 season, he signed as a free agent with the Baltimore Orioles, then after 1 year there, he was traded to the Giants. Kline finished his playing career in 2008 with the AAA Lehigh Valley IronPigs in the Philadelphia Phillies organization.

The Giants hired Kline in August 2008 as a roving pitching instructor. Kline was the pitching coach for the Augusta GreenJackets in 2009-2011 and the



San Jose Giants in 2012. After the latter season he worked as a pitching coach for New Zealand during the 2013 World Baseball Classic Qualifiers tournament. Kline returned to Augusta for the 2013-2014 seasons. He was with the Richmond Flying Squirrels in 2015-2017. Under Kline's direction, the Richmond pitching staff led the Eastern League in ERA (3.12) in 2015 and the team ranked second in ERA (3.48) in 2016. Kline moved up to the Sacramento River Cats for 2018-2019. Following the 2019 season, Kline served as the pitching coach for the Scottsdale Scorpions of the Arizona Fall League. He was scheduled to be pitching coach of Richmond in 2020 before the season was cancelled due to COVID-19. Kline was then pitching coach of Richmond in 2021.

In June 2021, Kline was named head coach of Indiana University of Pennsylvania for 2022. Taking over an IUP program that won only two games in 2021, he made strides quickly and took them to the 2024 Division II College World Series, their first trip to the Division II World Series. Kline remained with the Crimson Hawks through the 2025 season.



Melanie Morgan joined her first swim team at a young age. This team was coached by Larry Petrillo who would also be Melanie's coach when she reached Gateway High School. Melanie quickly excelled, and by the time she was 10 years old, she was training with the top team in the Pittsburgh area.

Melanie was one of the very few 12-year-olds to qualify for Junior Nationals the premier meet for competitive swimmers under the age of 18.

By the time Melanie reached high school she already had experience on a national level. During her high school career, Melanie won 7 individual WPIAL titles. She won the 50 yard freestyle all four years, and the 100 yard freestyle her sophomore, junior, and senior years. Melanie set WPIAL records in both events which both stood for many years. Melanie's record at the Pennsylvania State High School Swim meet was equally as impressive. Her freshman year, Melanie placed third in both the 50 yard freestyle and 100 yard freestyle. She won both events her sophomore, junior, and senior years. Melanie also set Pennsylvania State records in both events. Melanie's times from 35 years ago would have placed her second at the WPIAL Championships and second at the PA State Championships this year. Melanie was an 11 time All-American in high school. Her All American certificate from her junior year in the 100 freestyle is gold in color because she was the fastest high school swimmer in that event in the United States that year. She was featured in Sports Illustrated in the "Faces in the Crowd" section in 1988. Gateway High School created the "Melanie Morgan Award" which is given to one swimmer each year, male or female, who exemplifies dedication and leadership.

Melanie attended and swam for the University of Florida starting in 1989 & graduated in 1993. At the time, Florida was coached by one of the toughest coaches in the world and Melanie joined a team that had 13 Olympians from all over the world her freshman year. Melanie was a member of the



SEC championship team all four years she was at Florida. Melanie is a five time SEC champion. She showed her diversity in swimming by finishing in the top five at the SEC Championship Swim Meet in seven different individual events in freestyle, breaststroke, and butterfly.

While in college, Melanie qualified for the United States National Team and competed at the World University Games where she won gold and silver medals. Melanie's college career was capped off with a NCAA Division I Championship title in the 4X100 yard freestyle relay. That relay team won the NCAA title and broke the NCAA record, the US Open Record, and the American Record. These records stood for 10 years. After college Melanie was recruited to train with one of the first post -collegiate swimming program in the country lead by legendary Coach Jack Nelson in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. During that time, Melanie won two more national titles and one team title representing the Fort Lauderdale Swim Team.

Melanie competed in the United States Olympic Team Trials 3 times; 1988, 1992, and 1996.

Melanie currently works in medical sales. She also coaches for the South Fayette High School and Middle School swim teams. She currently lives in Bridgeville with her husband, Rob, and her two sons, Ryan, and Shawn.


MICHAEL MOORER

Boxer Mid Mon Valley Chapter

At age 10, Moorer's grandfather, a former New York Golden Gloves Champion encouraged Moorer to begin training at age 11. Moorer is naturally right-handed, but fought the entirety of his career as a southpaw. Moorer graduated from Monessen High School in 1987, where he starred in football as a linebacker and tight end.

From 1988 to 2008, his professional boxing career record was 52-4-1, with 40 KO's. He won a world championship on four occasions in two weight classes, having held the WBO light heavyweight title from 1988 to 1991; compiling 22 straight KOs in 22 fights and the WBO heavyweight title from 1992 to 1993; the unified WBA, IBF and lineal heavyweight titles in 1994; and regained the IBF heavyweight title again from 1996 to 1997 becoming a three-time heavyweight world champion.

Michael Moorer was an undefeated southpaw in his first 35 professional bouts. He captured the WBO light heavyweight title in 1988 which he defended 9 times. In 1991, Moorer moved up to Heavyweight winning the vacant WBO heavyweight title from Bert Cooper via TKO in 1992. He went on to beat Evander Holyfield for the unified WBA, IBF and lineal heavyweight titles in 1994. He remains one of only two southpaws to win the lineal world championship at heavyweight, being joined by Oleksandr Usyk, and the only light heavyweight world champion to win a heavyweight world title on more than one occasion.



Moorer is only one of four boxers over the last century that has ever won a version of a world title at both light heavyweight and heavyweight along with Roy Jones Jr., Michael Spinks, and James Toney.

Since retiring from the sport, Moorer has worked as a boxing trainer and private investigator. In 2009, he worked alongside Freddie Roach at the Wild Card gym in Los Angeles.

Moorer was inducted into the International Boxing Hall of Fame as part of the class of 2024.

DAVE PALONE

Harness Racing Washington-Greene Chapter

Palone became interested in harness racing after his father took him to watch the Adios Pace in 1976. In 1977, when Standardbred trainer Herman Hylkema allowed 15-year-old Dave Palone to jog one of his father's horses at hometown Waynesburg (Pennsylvania) Fairgrounds, the youngster was immediately, in his own words, "hooked." By the time he had finished high school Palone had worked his way up to second trainer for Hylkema. He received his provisional license to drive in 1982 at The Meadows, and two years later the patrons of the track voted him into its drivers' championship series where he ended up the winner.


Palone has collected the most wins in a year three times (1999, 2000, and 2004) and was voted Harness Tracks of America Driver of the Year in 1999, 2000, 2003, 2004, and 2009.

On September 22, 2005, Palone drove P Forty Seven to victory in the Little Brown Jug. The Little Brown Jug is the second leg of the Triple Crown of Harness Racing for Pacers.

Palone was inducted into the Harness Racing Hall of Fame on July 4, 2010.

Palone drove his 15,000th career winner on March 26, 2012, at The Meadows racetrack. Before Palone, only Hervé Filion had reached that harness racing milestone.

On July 5, 2012, Palone set a new North American record for wins when he drove Herculotte Hanover



to the winner's circle for his 15,181st career victory.

In January 2014, Palone was named Harness Tracks of America Driver of the Year for 2013.

On Friday, November 14, 2014, Palone set the world record for wins when he drove Missy Tap Tina to the winner's circle for his 16,754th career victory.

On June 25, 2022, Palone reached another milestone, becoming the first harness racer to reach 20,000 career wins after his victory in the fourth race at Hollywood Casino at the Meadows.

He has major wins at ADIOS, Little Brown Jugetter, and Glen Garnsey Memorial.
